# **Program Planning:**

Matthew McNair counsellors will visit Grades 8-11 classes in B block over the next few weeks so all students can get Programming Information where they will receive a personalized course selection form, learn about options for courses, changing graduation requirements and post-secondary prerequisites and prepare them for choosing their courses for next year. Our timetable and staffing for 2018-2019 is determined based on student enrollment and course requests, so students must select carefully, taking into consideration their summer school and online learning plans. It is difficult to make course changes later in the process. Grades 8-11 students will have an opportunity to check and confirm that their course selections are accurate later in the spring. Students and parents are encouraged to read the online course descriptions, discuss options with their classmates and current teachers and choose courses thoughtfully. ## **Transfers:**


Richmond students wishing to transfer to a non- catchment school must apply by filling out an RSB-SA23 Transfer Application form. Non-Richmond residents must complete an SA-73 TA form and both forms are available in every school office in Richmond. The form must be initialed by the catchment school, and then submitted to the requested school beginning Thursday, January 11, 2018. The final deadline for school transfer applications to be submitted to the office of the "requested school" is 4 p.m. on Friday, February 2, 2018. Please note that out-of-catchment students applying for the IB program must also complete the school transfer form. Applications received at the requested school by February 2 may be approved to attend, based on the criteria established by the Richmond School District (published on the form). Parents/legal guardians will be informed of the status of the transfer application at a date to be determined by the district. If parents wish to appeal a transfer denial, they can do so in writing. All transfer appeals must be submitted to the Office of the Superintendent of Schools. Transfer students wishing to play athletics must also complete the RSB Eligibility Form and attach it to their Transfer form. It is important to note that students who reside in Richmond and are currently attending Richmond Secondary School on a previous transfer do not need to reapply each year. ## **Marlinaires:**



Students are now welcome to attend the Resource centre on a drop-in basis, provided they have permission from their classroom teacher. Any student who is in need of some extra assistance in a subject area may come to the Resource Centre to get assistance from the teachers in the room. Similarly, we have also created an opportunity for students to access this assistance at lunch and after school. **Mr. McLellan** is a Math/Science specialist, is available to help students **during our lunch hour and until about 3:45** afterschool. If your child can benefit from this extra assistance, please remind them to advocate for

themselves and take advantage of this tremendous support. It is open to all students and if you want to know if your child is utilizing it, we have a check in and check out system that tracks who is accessing the system.

#### **Gr 12s**

Graduating students should be in the process of submitting their post-secondary applications. BC students applying to out-of-province universities should be familiar with admission requirements, important deadlines, how to apply and submit applications before Jan 2018.

**B.C. Institutions**: Students may apply directly to the institution or use EducationPlannerBC <a href="https://apply.educationplannerbc.ca">https://apply.educationplannerbc.ca</a>

**Ontario Institutions:** BC students must apply on-line through the Ontario Universities Application Website: <a href="http://www.ouac.on.ca/ouac-105/">http://www.ouac.on.ca/ouac-105/</a>

**Alberta Institutions**: Use the on-line application service <a href="https://applyalberta.ca/">https://applyalberta.ca/</a> **All Other Institutions**: Varies —check their website

**NEW! Student Transcripts Service (STS)**. Please note that the PSI "Choices" form is no longer available and is replaced by the StudentsTranscripts Service (STS). Students need their PEN number to register.

Grade 12 students should have set up their BCeID account and set up their accounts in order to have transcripts sent electronically to the colleges/universities they wish to apply to. If students are unsure how to do this, they can visit Ms Hudson.

\*Note: Some Post Secondary institutions may require student grade information earlier than available through this process. Students should be familiar with each institution's requirements regarding grade submission. If required, an official hardcopy transcript from the main office can be ordered. (\$5.00 per transcript).

#### **Document Deadlines**

Many universities & colleges require additional information such as transcripts or supplemental applications or profiles - this is called a "document deadline". This is separate from the application deadline and varies depending on the institution.

Students should register to write the TOEFL/IELTS and/or the LPI if required to do so. Contact the Career Centre or the individual post-secondary institutions you are applying to for requirements and exemptions.

#### **Scholarships**

Grade 12 students should be applying for scholarships. Several have been posted recently on the Weebly new page section. This is not an exhaustive list – more are located on the scholarship section of the Weebly website. Sd38careercentre.weebly.com
